

WOMEN IN THE U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 2004

In 2004, 60 women hold seats in the House of Representatives, comprising 13.8% of the 435 members. The women represent 26 states; 39 are Democrats and 21 are Republicans. Democratic women delegates represent the District of Columbia, Guam and the Virgin Islands. The congresswomen include 18 women of color: 11 African American women and 7 Latinas. The delegates include a Caribbean American and an African American.

Of the 59 women who served in the House in 2002, 3 did not seek re-election, 2 lost primaries, 2 lost in the general election and one died. The remaining 51 (35D, 16R) were re-elected.

Nancy Pelosi (D-CA), House Democratic Leader, holds the highest position achieved by a woman in Congress to date.

Of the 60 women who serve in the House in 2004, 50 first entered by winning regular general elections. Nine others won special elections; Bono (CA), Capps (CA), Herseth (D-SD); Lee (CA), Millender-McDonald (CA), Pelosi (CA), Ros-Lehtinen (FL), Watson (CA), and Wilson (NM) succeeded others who died or resigned. Emerson (MO) won a regular election simultaneously with a special election to fill a vacancy. The DC, GU and VI Delegates won regular general elections.

Prior to entering Congress, 44, or 73.3%, of the 60 women lawmakers held previous elective offices; 24 of the 44 held more than one post. The positions include: statewide elective (2); state senator (13); state representative (25); county governing board member (9); mayor (2); council member (12); judge (6); school board member (3).
