Women of color constitute 3.5% of the total 535 members of Congress. No women of color serve in the U.S. Senate.

STATEWIDE ELECTIVE EXECUTIVES — 5 (3D, 1R, 1NP**)

Of the **78** women serving in statewide elective executive offices, **5**, or **6.4**%, are women of color. Women of color constitute 1.6% of the total 315 statewide elective executives.

STATE LEGISLATORS — 329 (308D, 21R)

Of the 1,681 women state legislators serving nationwide, 329 or 19.6% are women of color. They include 85 senators and 244 representatives; 308 are Democrats and 21 are Republicans. Women of color constitute 4.5% of the total 7,382 state legislators.

African American women hold 224 (220D, 4R) seats in state legislatures. They include 58 senators and 166 representatives serving in 39 states.

Asian American/Pacific Islander women hold 25 (18D, 7R) seats in state legislatures. They include 6 senators and 19 representatives serving in 8 states (CA, HI, IA, MD, MN, SC, TX, WA).

Latinas hold 70 (62D, 8R) seats in state legislatures. They include 19 senators and 51 representatives serving in 17 states (AZ, CA, CO, CT, FL, IL, KS, MA, MD, NJ, NM, NV, NY, RI, SC, TX, WA).

Native American women hold 10 (8D, 2R) seats in state legislatures. They include 2 senators and 8 representatives in 6 states (AK, CO, OK, MT, ND, SD).
