

WOMEN OF COLOR IN ELECTIVE OFFICE 2011*

CONGRESS, STATEWIDE, STATE LEGISLATURE

CONGRESSWOMEN – 24 (22D, 2R)

Of the 90 women serving in the 112th U.S. Congress, 24, or 27%, are women of color, all serving in the House; in addition, an African American woman and a Caribbean American woman serve as Delegates to the House from Washington, DC and the Virgin Islands, respectively. Women of color constitute 4.5% of the total 535 members of Congress. No women of color serve in the U.S. Senate.

STATEWIDE ELECTIVE EXECUTIVES – 11 (6D, 4R, 1NP**)

Of the 71 women serving in statewide elective executive offices, 11, or 15.5%, are women of color. They include the first two women of color to serve as governors. Women of color constitute 3.5% of the total 317 statewide elective executives.

STATE LEGISLATORS – 348 (330D, 16R, 2NP)

Of the 1,750 women state legislators serving nationwide, 348 or 19.9% are women of color. They include 100 senators and 248 representatives; 330 are Democrats, 16 are Republicans, and two are non-partisan. Women of color constitute 4.7% of the total 7,382 state legislators. The first woman of color to serve as speaker of a state house or assembly was Karen Bass (D), speaker of the California assembly, who is African American. In 2010, an African American woman, Sheila Y. Oliver (D), was selected as speaker of the New Jersey state assembly, the second African American woman to serve as a speaker of a lower house.

African American women hold 242 (237D, 3R, 2NP) seats in state legislatures. They include 68 senators and 174 representatives in 40 states.

Asian American/Pacific Islander women hold 35 (29D, 6R) seats in state legislatures. They include 9 senators and 26 representatives in 10 states (AZ, CA, HI, ID, MA, MD, NY, TX, VT, WA).

Latinas hold 63 (57D, 6R) seats in state legislatures. They include 20 senators and 43 representatives in 20 states (AZ, CA, CO, CT, FL, IL, IN, MA, MD, MN, NC, NH, NJ, NM, NY, RI, TX, UT, WA, WI).

Native American women hold 8 (7D, 1R) seats in state legislatures. They include 3 senators and 5 representatives in 7 states (AZ, CO, KS, MT, NV, NM, OK).

* We use "women of color" when referring to African American, Asian American/Pacific Islander, Caribbean American, Latina, and Native American women as a group. We understand that both the terms "women of color" and "minority women" are problematic, but know of no preferable inclusive term.

** NP = election was nonpartisan.

U.S. SENATE

The only woman of color to serve in the U.S. Senate to date is Carol Moseley Braun (D-IL), an African American who was elected in 1992 and served from 1993-1999.
