# WOMEN IN ELECTIVE OFFICE 2011

In 2011, 90 women serve in the U.S. Congress. Seventeen women serve in the Senate and 73 women serve in the House. The number of women in statewide elective executive posts is 71, while the proportion of women in state legislatures is 23.7 percent.

#### CONGRESS

In 2011, women hold **90**, or **16.8%**, of the 535 seats in the 112th U.S. Congress — 17, or 17.0%, of the 100 seats in the Senate and 73, or 16.8%, of the 435 seats in the House of Representatives. Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi (D-CA), who was the first woman Speaker of the House, is now minority leader.

Seventeen (12D, 5R) women serve in the Senate: Kelly Ayotte (R-NH), Barbara Boxer (D-CA); Maria Cantwell (D-WA); Susan Collins (R-ME); Dianne Feinstein (D-CA); Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY); Kay Hagan (D-NC); Kay Bailey Hutchison (R-TX); Amy Klobuchar (D-MN); Mary Landrieu (D-LA); Claire McCaskill (D-MO); Barbara Mikulski (D-MD); Lisa Murkowski (R-AK); Patty Murray (D-WA); Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH); Olympia Snowe (R-ME); and Debbie Stabenow (D-MI).

Seventy-three women from 27 states serve in the House of Representatives; 49 are Democrats and 24 are Republicans. In addition, three Democratic women serve as the Delegates to the House from Guam, the Virgin Islands and Washington, DC.

## **STATEWIDE ELECTIVE EXECUTIVE OFFICES**

In 2011, 71 women hold statewide elective executive offices across the country; women hold 22.4% of the 317 available positions. Among these women, 39 are Democrats, 31 are Republicans, and 1 was elected in a nonpartisan race.

### STATE **LEGISLATURES**

In 2011, 1,750 (1,060D, 672R, 11NP, 4Prg., 3Ind), or 23.7%, of the 7,382 state legislators in the United States are women. Women hold 429 (267D, 150R, 11NP, 1Ind.), or 21.8%, of the 1,971 state senate seats and 1,321 (793D, 522R, 4Prg., 2Ind.), or 24.4%, of the 5,411 state house seats. Since 1971, the number of women serving in state legislatures has more than quintupled.

## MUNICIPAL OFFICIALS

As of June 2011, among the 100 largest cities in the U.S.,  ${\bf 9}$  had women mayors.

One is African American (Stephanie Rawlings-Blake, Baltimore); and one is Asian/Pacific Islander (Jean Quan, Oakland). In order of city population, 1 the mayors are:

As of June 2011, of the 252 mayors of U.S. cities with populations 100,000 and over, **30**, or **11.9%**, were women, including two African Americans, and one Asian/Pacific Islander. Of the 1167 mayors of U.S. cities with populations 30,000 and above, **203**, or **17.4%**, were women.<sup>2</sup>
