

WOMEN IN STATE LEGISLATURES 1983

Women hold 13.3% of all seats in state legislatures; in January of 1983 there were 991 female state legislators out of a total of 7,438 legislators. Since 1969, the number of women serving in state legislatures has more than tripled.

In 1983, women hold 8.7% of all state Senate seats (173 out of 1,986) and 15.0% of state House or Assembly seats (818 out of 5,452).

50 female legislators who served in 1971 are still in their state legislatures in 1983, including 10 who have moved from the state House to the state Senate and two who have moved from the state Senate to the state House.

Every state has at least three women in its legislature, but three states (Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas) have no women in the state Senate.

Black women constitute 6.0% (59 out of 991) of women in state legislatures. Hispanic women constitute less than 1 percent (0.7% or 7 out of 991) of women state legislators.

Women hold 2.5% (7 out of 279) of top legislative leadership positions. These positions include House speakers, Senate presidents, and majority and minority leaders in each house.
