

WOMEN IN STATE LEGISLATURES 1990

In 1990, 1,273, or 17.1%, of the 7,461 state legislators in the United States are women. Women hold 267, or 13.4%, of the 1,995 state senate seats and 1,006, or 18.4%, of the 5,466 state house or assembly seats. Since 1969, the number of women serving in state legislatures has more than quadrupled.

Every state has at least three women in its state house, and only one state (Louisiana) has no women in its state senate.

Two women are **speakers of houses** in 1990: Representative Jane Hull (R-AZ) and Representative Vera Katz (D-OR).

The first woman to serve in a state legislature was Martha Hughes Canon; she was elected to the Utah State Senate in 1896.

*In Nebraska, where the legislature is unicameral, legislators are elected on a nonpartisan basis.
