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## WOMEN IN STATE LEGISLATURES 1994

In 1994, 1,547, or 20.8% of the 7,424 state legislators in the United States are women. Women hold 351, or 17.7%, of the 1,984 state senate seats and 1,196, or 22.0%, of the 5,440 state house or assembly seats. Since 1969, the number of women serving in state legislatures has increased five-fold.

In 1994, no women legislators serve as senate presidents. Representative Ramona Barnes (R-AK) is the only woman serving as speaker of a state house. Including Representative Barnes, in the history of the United States, two women legislators have served as senate presidents and eight as speakers of a state house.

In 1894, the first women state legislators were elected to serve in the United States. Three Republican women were elected to the Colorado Hease of Representatives: Clara Cressingham; Carrie C. Holly; Frances Klock. The first woman state senator, Democrat Martha Hughes Canon, was elected to the Utah State Senate in 1896.\*\*\*\*

<sup>\*</sup>In Nebraska, where the legislature is unicameral, legislators are elected on a nonpartisan basis.

<sup>\*\*</sup>One Democratic incumbent California State Senator ran as an independent in 1992; one candidate ran on the Liberal Party ticket for the New York Assembly in a 1994 special election.

<sup>\*\*\*</sup>States with the same exact percentage (AZ & VT) are given the same rank (3). Since there is a tie, there is no fourth rank. States which round out to the same figure (AZ/VT & NH; AR & PA), but are not exactly the same are ranked differently. Rankings for these states are: AZ/VT=3; NH=5; AR=45; and PA=46.
