WOMEN IN STATE LEGISLATURES 1996

In 1996, **1,545**, or **20.8**% of the 7,424 state legislators in the United States are women. Women currently hold **344**, or 17.3%, of the 1,984 state senate seats and **1,201**, or 22.1%, of the 5,440 state house or assembly seats. Since 1969, the number of women serving in state legislatures has increased five-fold.

In 1894, the first women state legislators were elected to serve in the United States. Three Republican women were elected to the Colorado House of Representatives: Clara Cressingham; Carrie C. Holly; Frances Klock. The first woman state senator, Democrat Martha Hughes Canon, was elected to the Utah State Senate in 1896.***
