STATEWIDE ELECTIVE EXECUTIVE WOMEN 2002

In 2002, 88 women hold statewide elective executive offices across the country; women hold 27.4% of the 321 available positions.* Among these women 43 are Democrats, 41 are Republicans, 1 is a member of the Independence Party and 3 were elected in nonpartisan races.

To date, women have been elected statewide to executive offices in 48 of the nation's 50 states. In Maine, the governor is the only executive elected statewide, and a woman has never served as governor there. The other state where a woman has never been elected statewide to an executive post is West Virginia.

GOVERNORS

Five women (2D, 3R) serve as governors in 2002.**

Jane Dee Hull, an Arizona Republican, became governor through constitutional succession in September 1997 upon the resignation of Governor Fife Symington and won election in her own right in 1998. Hull was elected Secretary of State in 1994. She was a member of Arizona's House of Representatives from 1978 until 1992; she served as Majority Whip from 1987-1988 and Speaker of the House from 1989-1992.

Judy Martz, a Montana Republican, won the race for an open gubernatorial post in 2000. In 1996, she became the first woman lieutenant governor of Montana. Martz served as chair of the Governor's Drought Advisory Council, the Governor's Summit on Youth/Montana's Promise and as co-chair of the Montana-Alberta Boundary Advisory Commission. From 1992-1998, Martz served on the St. James Community Hospital Board. She is a businesswoman.

Ruth Ann Minner, a Delaware Democrat, won the race for an open gubernatorial post in 2000. In 1992, she became the first woman lieutenant governor to be elected in Delaware. In 1996, she was reelected with more than 70 percent of the vote. From 1982-1992 she served in the Delaware State Senate. From 1974-1982, Minner was a member of the Delaware State House of Representatives, where she was House Majority Whip from 1981-1982. Minner is a businesswoman; early in her career she was a receptionist in the governor's office.

Jeanne Shaheen, a New Hampshire Democrat, won the race for an open gubernatorial post in 1996 and won re-election in 1998. Shaheen served in the state senate from 1990 to 1996 and was a member of the executive committee of the Democratic State Committee from 1994 to 1996. She has also managed campaigns, owned and managed a business, and taught in public schools.

Jane Swift, a Massachusetts Republican, succeeded former governor Paul Celluci in April 2001, when he was appointed Ambassador to Canada. Swift was elected lieutenant governor of Massachusetts in 1998; prior to her election, she served as director for both the state Office of Consumer Affairs and Business Regulations. She had previously been director of Regional Airport Development at the Massachusetts Port Authority Board. In 1991, Jane Swift became the youngest woman elected to the state senate, where she served as the assistant minority leader. In 1996, she ran unsuccessfully for a Congressional seat.

HISTORY OF WOMEN GOVERNORS

Nineteen women (13D, 6R) have served as governors of states; in addition, a woman currently serves as governor of Puerto Rico. Of the 19, 12 were first elected in their own right; 3 replaced their husbands, and 4 became governor by constitutional succession, one of whom subsequently won a full term. The record number of women serving simultaneously is 5, which first occurred in January 2001 for a few weeks until former New Jersey Governor Christine Todd Whitman stepped down; when Governor Swift took office in April 2001, there were once again five women governors. Four women have served at once on three earlier occasions: 1/91 - 3/91, 1994, and briefly in 1997.

Nancy Hollister (R-OH)	1998-1999	Elected lieutenant governor; served as governor for 11 days when predecessor took U.S. Senate seat and successor had not yet been sworn in

Ruth Ann Minner (D-DE)	2001-present	
Jane Swift (R-MA)	2001-present	Elected as lieutenant governor, succeeded governor who resigned for an ambassadorial appointment.
