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STATEWIDE ELECTIVE EXECUTIVE WOMEN 2007

In 2007, **76** women hold statewide elective executive offices across the country; women hold **24.1%** of the 315 available positions.* Among these women **45** are Democrats, **28** are Republicans, and **3** were elected in nonpartisan races.

To date, women have been elected statewide to executive offices in 49 of the nation's 50 states. In Maine, the governor is the only executive elected statewide, and a woman has never served as governor there.

GOVERNORS

Nine women (6D, 3R) serve as governors in 2007.

Kathleen Blanco, a Louisiana Democrat, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2003. She was lieutenant governor from 1996-2004 and public service commissioner from 1993-1994. From 1984-1992, Blanco served two terms in the Louisiana State House of Representatives.

Jennifer M. Granholm, a Michigan Democrat, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2002 and re-election in 2006. She served as Michigan's attorney general from 1998-2002. She was Wayne County corporation counsel from 1994 to 1998. After law school, she clerked for a member of the Sixth Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals and was a prosecutor in the U.S. Attorney's office.

Christine Gregoire, a Washington Democrat, won a very close race in 2004 for an open gubernatorial seat. She was first elected attorney general in 1992 and re-elected in 1996 and 2000. An attorney, she served as director of Washington State's Department of Ecology.

Linda Lingle, a Hawaii Republican, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2002 and re-election in 2006. She first ran for governor in 1998. Lingle served as mayor of Maui County from 1991-1998, the maximum two consecutive four-year terms. She was first elected to the Maui County Council in 1980 and served five terms. Lingle was the founder and publisher of a local community newspaper.

Ruth Ann Minner, a Delaware Democrat, won an open gubernatorial post in 2000 and won re-election in 2004. In 1992, she became the first woman lieutenant governor elected in Delaware; in 1996, she was reelected. From 1982-1992 she served in the Delaware State Senate. From 1974-1982, Minner was a member of the Delaware State House of Representatives, where she was House Majority Whip from 1981-1982. Minner is a businesswoman; early in her career, she was a receptionist in the governor's office.

Janet Napolitano, an Arizona Democrat, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2002 and re-election in 2006. She served as her state's attorney general from 1998-2002. From 1993 to 1998, Napolitano served as Arizona's U.S. Attorney. She had earlier clerked for a judge in the Ninth Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals and worked as an attorney in private practice.

Sarah Palin, an Alaska Republican, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2006. She served as chairman of the Alaska's Oil and Gas Conservation Commission from 2003 to 2004. Palin served on the Interstate Oil and Gas Compact Commission. From 1996 to 2002, she served two terms as mayor and CEO of Wasilla County. Prior to her mayoral run, Palin served two terms on the Wasilla City Council from 1992 to 1996.

M. Jodi Rell, a Connecticut Republican, was first elected lieutenant governor in 1994 and re-elected in 1998 and 2002. She became governor July 1, 2004 when her predecessor resigned, and in 2006 was elected to a full term. Prior to her election as lieutenant governor, Rell served in the Connecticut House of Representatives from 1984 to 1994, where she was assistant minority leader and deputy minority leader.

Kathleen Sebelius, a Kansas Democrat, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2002 and won re-election in 2006. She was elected Kansas Insurance Commissioner in 1994. She served in the Kansas House of Representatives from 1987 to 1994. With professional training in public administration, she had previously worked in the Kansas Department of Corrections and served on the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission.

HISTORY OF WOMEN GOVERNORS

Twenty-nine women (18D,11R) have served as governors in 22 states. In addition, one women has served as governor in Puerto Rico. Arizona is the first state where a woman succeeded another woman as governor, and the first state to have had three women governors. Of the 28 women governors, 19 were first elected in their own right; 3 replaced their husbands, and 7 became governor by constitutional succession, two of whom subsequently won a full term. The record number of women serving simultaneously, achieved in 2004 and again in 2007, is 9.
