

STATEWIDE ELECTIVE EXECUTIVE WOMEN 2010

In 2010, 71 women hold statewide elective executive offices across the country; women hold 22.5% of the 315 available positions.* Among these women 50 are Democrats, 20 are Republicans, and 1 was elected in a nonpartisan race.

To date, women have been elected statewide to executive offices in 49 of the nation's 50 states. In Maine, the governor is the only executive elected statewide, and a woman has never served as governor there.

GOVERNORS

Six women (3D, 3R) serve as **governors** in 2010.

Jan Brewer, an Arizona Republican, became governor by constitutional succession when Janet Napolitano resigned to become Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security. Brewer was elected secretary of state in 2002 and 2006. She served as Maricopa County supervisor from 1997 to 2002. She served in Arizona's State Senate and House of Representatives from 1983 to 1996.

Jennifer M. Granholm, a Michigan Democrat, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2002 and re-election in 2006. She served as Michigan's attorney general from 1998-2002. She was Wayne County corporation counsel from 1994 to 1998. After law school, she clerked for a member of the Sixth Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals and was a prosecutor in the U.S. Attorney's office.

Christine Gregoire, a Washington Democrat, won a very close race in 2004 for an open gubernatorial seat. She was first elected attorney general in 1992 and re-elected in 1996 and 2000. An attorney, she served as director of Washington State's Department of Ecology.

Linda Lingle, a Hawaii Republican, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2002 and re-election in 2006. She first ran for governor in 1998. Lingle served as mayor of Maui County from 1991-1998, the maximum two consecutive four-year terms. She was first elected to the Maui County Council in 1980 and served five terms. Lingle was the founder and publisher of a local community newspaper.

Beverly M. Perdue, a North Carolina Democrat, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2008. She was elected lieutenant governor in 2000 and 2004. She served in the North Carolina State Senate and House of Representatives from 1987 to 1999. She was a public school teacher and served as director of geriatric services at a community hospital. She holds a Ph.D. in education administration.

M. Jodi Rell, a Connecticut Republican, was first elected lieutenant governor in 1994 and re-elected in 1998 and 2002. She became governor July 1, 2004 when her predecessor resigned, and in 2006 was elected to a full term. Prior to her election as lieutenant governor, Rell served in the Connecticut House of Representatives from 1984 to 1994, where she was assistant minority leader and deputy minority leader.

HISTORY OF WOMEN GOVERNORS

Thirty-one women (19D,12R) have served as governors in 23 states. In addition, one woman has served as governor in Puerto Rico. Arizona is the first state where a woman succeeded another woman as governor, and the first state to have had four women governors. Of the 31 women governors, 20 were first elected in their own right; 3 replaced their husbands, and 8 became governor by constitutional succession, two of whom subsequently won a full term. The record number of women serving simultaneously, achieved in 2004 and again in 2007, is 9.

* These figures do not include: officials in appointive state cabinet-level positions; officials elected to executive posts by the legislature; officials elected as commissioners or board members from districts rather than statewide; members of the judicial branch; or elected members of university Boards of Trustees or Boards of Education.

Nancy Hollister (R-OH)	1998-1999	Elected lieutenant governor; served as governor for 11 days when predecessor took U.S. Senate seat and successor had not yet been sworn in.
Jane Swift (R-MA)	2001-2003	Elected as lieutenant governor, succeeded governor who resigned for an ambassadorial appointment.
